By-law No. 114-2016

Being a By-law to Adopt a Winter Control Plan for 2016-2020 and to repeal By-law No. 124-2013

Whereas Section 44(1) of the *Municipal Act, 2001,* as amended, provides a municipality that has jurisdiction over a highway or bridge shall keep it in a state of repair that is reasonable in the circumstances, including the character and location of the highway or bridge; and

Whereas O.Regulation 239/02, as amended, establishes Minimum Maintenance Standards For Municipal Highways, which specify service levels based on road classification; and

Whereas Report No. IS-35-2016 was considered at the Council-in-Committee Meeting of October 17, 2016, and subsequently authorized and approved by Council to adopt a Winter Control Plan for 2016-2020 comprised of Standards and Operational Guidelines, in the form of Schedule "A" attached to this by-law;

Whereas it is deemed expedient to approve and adopt the Winter Control Plan for 2016-2020;

Now therefore the Municipal Council of The Corporation of the Town of Fort Erie enacts as follows:

- 1. **That** the Winter Control Plan for 2016-2020 attached as Schedule "A" to and forming part of this by-law, is approved and adopted.
- 2. That the Director of Infrastructure Services of The Corporation of the Town of Fort Erie, or his or her designate, is responsible for administering the Winter Control Plan for 2016-2020.
- **3.** That notwithstanding the term set out in the Winter Control Plan for 2016-2020, the Plan shall remain in force and effect until such time as it is repealed or replaced.
- 4. That By-law No. 124-2013 is repealed.

5. That the Clerk of the Town is authorized to effect any minor modifications, corrections, or omissions, solely of an administrative, numerical, grammatical, semantical or descriptive nature to this by-law or its schedules after the passage of this by-law.

Read a first, second and third time and finally passed this 24th day of October, 2016.

Purpose of Report

The purpose of this report is to seek Council's approval of the Winter Control Plan 2016-2020 as well as to seek direction to prepare a By-law to adopt the Plan and repeal the by-law that adopted the previous plan.

Analysis

The previous Winter Control Plan was adopted by Council for the period of Fall 2013 to Spring 2016. The proposed Winter Control Plan, will be drafted as applicable to the winter seasons 2016 to 2020 to facilitate effective budgeting and encourage contractor investment in updated equipment. Additionally, the four (4) year term will allow, on an ongoing basis, a Council to have two (2) winter seasons to become familiar with the Plan and resident winter maintenance concerns and then to provide Council with an opportunity to revise the Plan effective for the final two (2) years of their term.

The time period of the contract for "Winter Control Equipment" which Council awarded through Administrative Report IS-27-2016 on August 25, 2016 is aligned with this revised Winter Control Plan timeframe. The quotation for "Snow Plowing Town Parking Lots and Alleyways" will be aligned with a similar one that was issued by the Parks and Facilities Division and the resulting three (3) year tender will be issued by the Roads and Fleet Division in 2017. This will necessitate changes to this proposed Winter Control Plan and an amended by-law. Subsequent tenders will be issued on a four-year basis to match the "Winter Control Equipment" tender.

In addition to updating the Winter Control Plan for the successful contractors, a thorough review of the Plan for other changes was conducted. The resulting plan encompasses the following revisions:

Section 2 and 3 Minimum Maintenance Standards – While there were no revisions to these sections, it is notable that significant changes to the Minimum Maintenance Standards are anticipated during the term of this plan. Proposed changes include standards to clear "all" sidewalks and to treat sidewalks with sand or salt. Additionally, the regulation is expected to include an option to issue public weather event notices to alert the public when weather conditions are significantly challenging the ability of winter control resources to maintain the standards within the normal timeframes.

It should be noted that currently the Town plows 56 km of sidewalks at an annual cost of \$ 60,000. Should the Minimum Maintenance Standards change to include plowing & salting of "all" sidewalks, that would equate to plowing 160 km at an estimated annual cost of \$180,000 plus an additionally estimated \$100,000 for salting.

Section 4 Salt Management Plan – No changes. As noted, the National Performance Indicators and Targets for the Code of Practice for Environmental Management of Road Salts in Canada require staff review before completion of a revised Salt Management Plan.

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Section 5 Hours of Work – The Hours of Service procedure has been updated to a new format and reflects recent department name changes.

Section 6 Road Snow Plowing – Table 2 of the Plan was updated to reflect the changes in contractors, based on route assignments following the award of the contract for "Winter Control Equipment" under Report No. IS-27-2016.

Section 7 Road Sanding and Salting – Table 4 of the Plan was updated to reflect the change in sanding contractor and all routes were changed to include new roads and subdivisions.

Section 8 Snow Removal - No changes to the Plan.

Section 9 Snow Fence Erection and Removal – Some additional locations on Point Abino Road have been added to the Plan.

Section 10 Winter Road Patrols – The Level of Service was amended to reflect the new role of the Winter Weekend Crew Leader.

Section 11 Sidewalk Snow Plowing – Table 6 of the Plan was revised to show the addition of the third contracted sidewalk plow and the maps were revised to exclude the Edgemere / Lakeshore section that is part of the Friendship Trail. Additionally, the footpath connecting Champlain Drive West to Bertie Street was added. The special procedure for clearing the Central Avenue Bridge was removed as sidewalks can now be maintained according to existing procedure there is no longer a need to plow these sidewalks clear with a snow blower.

Additionally, some comments were included regarding the school crossing areas and transit stops. Further to transit stop clearing, if Council accepts the proposed reroute for 2017, a full capital program is to be overlaid onto the transit system for signs/ pads/ shelters and benches by March 2018. This will increase winter maintenance requirements.

Section 12 Parking Lots, Alleyways – The maps have been changed to a new format. Both the maps and table reflect the removal of Fire Station 2 and the new page numbers.

Section 13 Regulation of Snow Deposits – No changes.

Additionally, the Table of Contents, Title Page and Footer were changed to reflect revised page numbers, the current administrative report and by-law date and numbers.

Financial/Staffing Implications

This revision to the Winter Control Plan is not anticipated to affect staffing levels, nor have any financial implications.

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The annual Winter Control budget is based on an average of previous years' winter control costs. Winter control operations will be conducted to meet the requirements of the Minimum Maintenance Standards. Multiple or extreme winter weather events may result in the overrun of the operating budget and Council will be advised accordingly.

Future changes required as a result of changes to legislation, particularly the Minimum Maintenance Standards may have a financial impact, at which time these will be brought to Council's attention.

Policies Affecting Proposal

By-law No. 90-15 adopted Council's 2015-2018 Corporate Strategic Plan which included a goal of creating an inventory of customer service levels. The Winter Control Plan documentation of the winter maintenance standards and levels of service provided to roads and sidewalks.

The Municipal Act, 2001, S.O. 2001, c.25 Section 44 provides that municipalities with jurisdiction over a highway or bridge shall keep it in a state of repair that is reasonable in the circumstances. If the municipality defaults in complying with its obligation to maintain and repair, it is liable for all damages any person sustains as a result.

Ontario Regulation 239/02 under the Municipal Act specifies Minimum Maintenance Standards that define service levels of road maintenance based on the road classification system. Winter control maintenance is addressed in the amount of snow that can accumulate and the timeframe to clear it in, as well as the timeframe to treat icy roadways. A municipality can avoid liability for failing to keep a highway or bridge in a reasonable state of repair if, at the time of an accident, the Minimum Standards have been met.

By-law 40-2004 adopts a policy for Minimum Maintenance Standards for roads in the Town of Fort Erie. Through this by-law, the Standards for Maintenance are those set out in the Minimum Maintenance Standards including any subsequent changes.

Comments from Relevant Departments/Community and Corporate Partners

The revised Winter Control Plan attempts to address comments and concerns brought forward by Council and the general public. Additionally, input was received from staff and contractors.

Communicating Results

Once approved, the Winter Control Plan will be made available on the website and in hard copy for viewing at both Town Hall and the John L. Gibson Operations Centre.

As it is posted to the website, the Communications Coordinator will be asked to promote the Plan through appropriate social media.

An updated version of our 'Snow-How' brochure created in-house in 2015, that provides a guide to winter control services within the Town, will be distributed through local media channels.

Alternatives

As an alternative to approving the Winter Control Plan 2016-2020, Council could withhold approval and thereby advise staff to continue with the current Winter Control Plan. This alternative is not recommended as references to contractors and equipment in the current Plan are outdated, as are the other proposed changes. The revised Plan continues to represent a balance between compliance with applicable legislation and the expectations of ratepayers, as historically expressed.

Council may ask staff to further revise the proposed Winter Control Plan. Note that any increase in service levels would have a budget impact. Alternatively, any reduction in service levels may have legal implications, in addition to a budget impact.

Conclusion

Council approval of the revised Winter Control Plan, 2016-2020 will adopt the most current Plan, and will facilitate the defence of liability claims against the Town.

By-law 114-2016 is shown here in draft form as proposed by-law only. The adopted by-law is available on the Town's website.

Minimum Maintenance Standards

Ontario Regulation 239/02 establishes Minimum Maintenance Standards for municipalities that specify general maintenance standards. Portions of these standards address winter road maintenance levels.

In this regulation, roads are divided into classes based on a combination of traffic volume and speed limit factors. The Town of Fort Erie maintains roads that range from Class 3, which are well travelled to Class 6, which include roads with stone surfaces.

Note that Class 6 roads are not subject to the Minimum Maintenance Standards summarized in Table 1 "Summary of Minimum Maintenance Standards" below and will not be further described in this plan. Winter maintenance is performed on Class 6 roads in Fort Erie, generally to the service level of Class 5 roads.

Section 4 of Ontario Regulation 239/02, and as amended by Ontario Regulations 23/10 and 47/13, describes that newly fallen, wind-blown or slush snow is to be cleared once snow accumulation is more than the depth set out in Table 1 below, depending on the road class. The snow clearing is to be done either while the snow continues to accumulate or after the snowfall has ended, but at a minimum, within the timeframes set out in Table 1. This section of the regulation also sets out the width of the clearing and exempts parking areas.


Section 5 specifies that roadways be monitored and patrolled at appropriate intervals for ice and that icy roadways be treated to prevent ice formation. Section 5 further specifies that if ice forms, the roadway is to be treated within the timeframe shown in Table 1.

By-law 40-04, which evolved out of Administrative Report PW-12-04, adopts the standards in Ontario Regulation 239/02 including any amendments as the Maintenance Standards for Municipal Highways in the Town of Fort Erie:



WHEREAS Subsection 11(2) of the *Municipal Act, 2001* as amended provides for spheres of jurisdiction and under the table thereafter it states that a lower-tier municipality and an upper-tier municipality may pass by-laws respecting highways, including parking and traffic on the highways, and

WHEREAS Section 30 of the said *Municipal Act* provides that a highway is owned by the municipality that has jurisdiction over it subject to any rights reserved by a person who dedicated the highway or any interest in the land held by any other person, and

WHEREAS Subsection 44(1) of the said *Act* provides the municipality that has jurisdiction over a highway or a bridge shall keep it in a state of repair that is reasonable in the circumstances, including the character and location of the highway or bridge, and

WHEREAS Subsection 44(2) of the said *Act* provides a municipality that defaults in complying with Subsection (1) is, subject to the *Negligence Act*, liable for all damages any person sustains because of the default, and

WHEREAS Subsection 44(3) of the said *Act* provides that despite Subsection (2), a municipality is not liable for failing to keep a highway or bridge in a reasonable state of repair if,


- (a) it did not know and could not reasonably have been expected to have known about the state of repair of the highway or bridge;
- (b) it took reasonable steps to prevent the default from arising; or
- (c) at the time the cause of action arose, minimum standards established under Subsection (4) applied to the highway or bridge and to the alleged default and those standards have been met, and

WHEREAS Subsections 44(4) and (5) of the said *Act* provides the Minister of Transportation may make regulations establishing minimum standards of repair for highways and bridges or any class of them and the minimum standards may be general or specific in their application, and

WHEREAS Subsection 44(6) of the said *Act* provides that a regulation made under Subsection (4) may adopt by reference, in whole or in part, with such changes as the Minister of Transportation considers desirable, any code, standard or guideline, as it reads at the time the regulation is made or as it is amended from time to time, whether before or after the regulation is made, and

WHEREAS Ontario Regulation 239/02 was filed on August 8, 2002 to establish Minimum Maintenance Standards for Municipal Highways, and

WHEREAS at the Council-in-Committee meeting of March 1, 2004 Report No. PW-12-04 was approved to adopt the Minimum Maintenance Standards as prescribed in Ontario Regulation 239/02 as a basic level of service for road maintenance within the Town of Fort Erie, and



Ontario Regulation 239/02 was amended by Ontario Regulation 23/10 which increased patrol requirements and added "slush" as a possible snow accumulation. Ontario Regulation 239/02 was further amended by Ontario Regulation 47/13. Some of the changes that affected winter control included:

- Clarification of the definitions of ice and snow accumulation,
- Addition of requirements for weather monitoring, and,
- Further specifications to the standard for treatment of icy roadways.

This plan includes consideration of these additional requirements.

Salt Management Plan

The Town of Fort Erie Salt Management Plan was adopted in 2004 through Administrative Report IS-04-05, to work towards best management practices as recommended by Environment Canada in the *"Code of Practice for the Environmental Management of Road Salts"*.

These best management practices were designed to minimize the adverse environmental effects of the storage and application of road salts and abrasives during winter road maintenance, as well as the disposal of snow containing road salts.

The Code of Practice as well as the Transportation Association of Canada's "Syntheses of Best Practices – Road Salt Management" includes guidelines for the development of a detailed salt management plan.

Both of these guidance documents were reviewed and revised recently by Environment Canada and the Transportation Association of Canada, respectively.

The Town's Salt Management Plan will be revised to encompass the recommendations contained in the revised guidance documents. The revised Salt Management Plan will include the recommended requirement for an annual review of the plan with specific targets to achieve best management practices.

Operating Procedure IS-OPS-P001 Hours of Service

Origin:

O. Reg. 555/06 made under the *Highway Traffic Act* prescribes hours of service for a driver of a commercial motor vehicle. In particular, it defines duty status time, limits on-duty time and provides for exemptions (s. 3(1), paras. 4 and 4.1) in the case of municipalities responding to situations of imminent danger as well as to emergency situations of major proportions.

Purpose:

The Infrastructure Services Department has implemented an electronic database to track employee hours of service to ensure an employee does not exceed 70 hours of on-duty time in the chosen seven-day cycle. A "day" begins 00:00 and ends at 23:59.

The intent of this guideline is to ensure regulatory compliance and to attempt to meet the requirements of our adopted levels of service. The scope and level of service delivery components have been implemented to address the municipality's inherent responsibility for the protection of the public, property and the environment.

This document is intended as a guide. It is understood that our service delivery levels regularly require the deployment of employees outside the normal work schedule. Each employee deployment will be event specific. "Event" includes a situation or impending situation that poses a danger to life, property or the environment.

Scope:

Factors affecting employee deployments include:

- 1. Nature of the event
- 2. Imminent danger to people, property or environment
- 3. Time of day
- 4. Level of service expectations
- 5. Employee availability logged hours

Operating Procedure IS-OPS-P001 Hours of Service

1. Nature of the event:

Events include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Winter control road patrols, sanding, plowing
- · Wet weather event surface flooding, sanitary sewer surcharging
- Water main break
- Sanitary sewer main break
- · Wind storm downed trees, powerlines or other installations
- Significant power outages

2. Imminent danger to life, property or environment:

- The deployment of employees to deal with each event will be event specific.
- The event needs assessment and degree of risk will be the responsibility of the acting manager/supervisor.

Time of day

- If the exemption is used, a regularly scheduled 10 hour shift should not be extended more than six hours such that total on-duty time equals 16 hours.
- A minimum 8 hour off-duty rest period will follow the extended shift described above.
- Length of permitted duty time on a call-in may be influenced by time of day and previous on-duty time. For example, if a call-in is required at 11:00 pm, after the end of a regular shift at5:00 pm, the Duty/On-call Supervisor will assess the need to address the event while remaining aware of logging employee on-duty time in preparation of ensuring appropriate off-duty time once the event has been managed.
- Level of service expectations
 - Adopted winter control plans describe service delivery expectations for each class of the road network including sidewalks.
 - Water main and sanitary sewer events will be addressed based on the level of danger to life, property and the environment and to ensure continuity of access to essential services.
- Employee availability logged hours

After hours call-ins will take in to consideration:

- Off-duty time periods (most recent and previous)
- Previous day on-duty hours
- Scheduled shift commitment for remaining week/cycle

Operating Procedure IS-OPS-P001 Hours of Service

Protocol:

The Duty/On-call Supervisor will be primarily responsible for assessing each event and determining employees and equipment that may be required to address the event.

The Infrastructure Services Managers will provide consultation as may be required in determining event specific needs.

The Duty Supervisor will:

- 1. Document the particulars of the event that led to the decision to apply the exemption.
- 2. Maintain a log of event start and stop times and duration
- 3. Retain each employee's completed record for the day or Duty Service Log
- Declare a "return to compliance" with the hours of work requirements
- 5. Advise employees of mandatory rest period prior to the next on-duty period

In Summary:

Management and supervisory staff (including Duty/On-call Supervisors) are tasked with ensuring operations comply with the regulation and this guideline. In addition, every employee has been trained and has a legal responsibility to document and advise the respective supervisor of total hours logged and any and all conditions that impact the safe operation of a municipal vehicle.

Premature termination of a scheduled shift may be warranted if employee fatigue would compromise the safe operation of a vehicle, regardless of hours of service.

Management of each deployment of employees/equipment will be event specific. The exemptions in s. 3(1), paras. 4 and 4.1 of O.Reg. 555/06 will not be utilized as blanket exemptions to all events.

In the event of any extension to an on-duty schedule, a mandatory total of 10 hours of off-duty time will be provided each day, notwithstanding any use of an exemption.

The terms and conditions contained herein will govern employee deployments in ensuring adequate off-duty rest periods are provided.

An employee providing service delivery outside regularly scheduled shifts may be provided paid time off for a portion or all of a normal duty schedule to facilitate the required off-duty rest periods.

Hours of Service Legislation

Excerpts from Ontario Regulation 555/06

DAILY REQUIREMENTS

Designation of driver's day

4. (1) The operator shall designate the hour at which the driver's day starts if it does not start at midnight and shall notify the driver of the designation. O. Reg. 555/06, s. 4 (1).

(2) The designation shall apply for the duration of the driver's cycle. O. Reg. 555/06, s. 4 (2).

Daily driving time

5. (1) After a driver has accumulated 13 hours of driving time in a day, the driver shall not drive again on the same day. O. Reg. 555/06, s. 5 (1).

(2) After a driver has accumulated 14 hours of on-duty time in a day, the driver shall not drive again on the same day. O. Reg. 555/06, s. 5(2).

Daily off-duty time

6. (1) A driver shall take at least 10 hours of off-duty time in a day. O. Reg. 555/06, s. 6 (1).

(2) Off-duty time under subsection (1) that is in addition to the mandatory eight consecutive hours of off-duty time required by section 9 may be distributed throughout the day in blocks of no less than 30 minutes each. O. Reg. 555/06, s. 6 (2).

(3) The off-duty time referred to in subsection (2) shall be at least two hours and may be added to the mandatory eight consecutive hours of off-duty time but cannot form part of it. O. Reg. 555/06, s. 6 (3).

Deferral of off-duty time

<u>7.</u> A driver may split the off-duty time required by section 6 over any two consecutive days by deferring a maximum of two hours of the daily off-duty time from the first day to the second day and increasing the total of the driving and on-duty times in the first day by not more than two hours if,

(a) the deferred off-duty time does not form part of the mandatory period of eight consecutive hours of off-duty time required by section 9;

(b) before the end of the second day, the driver takes a consecutive period of off-duty time consisting of the eight consecutive hours required by section 9 plus the off-duty time deferred from the first day;

(c) the total off-duty time taken in the two days is at least 20 hours;

(d) the total driving time in the two days does not exceed 26 hours;

(e) the total on-duty time in the two days does not exceed 28 hours;

(f) the driver is not splitting off-duty time under section 11 at any time during the two days; and

(g) an entry is made in the "Remarks" section of the daily log or on the record required by subsection 18 (3) clearly indicating the day from which the off-duty time has been deferred and the day to which it was deferred. O. Reg. 555/06, s. 7.

Hours of Service Legislation

Excerpts from Ontario Regulation 555/06, Continued

Mandatory off-duty time

<u>9. (1)</u> After a driver has accumulated 13 hours of driving time from the end of the most recent period of eight or more consecutive hours of off-duty time, the driver shall not drive again unless he or she takes at least eight consecutive hours of off-duty time. O. Reg. 555/06, s. 9 (1).

(2) After a driver has accumulated 14 hours of on-duty time from the end of the most recent period of eight or more consecutive hours of off-duty time, the driver shall not drive again unless he or she takes at least eight consecutive hours of off-duty time. O. Reg. 555/06, s. 9 (2).

(3) After 16 hours have elapsed from the end of the most recent period of eight or more consecutive hours of off-duty time, the driver shall not drive again unless he or she takes at least eight consecutive hours of off-duty time. O. Reg. 555/06, s. 9 (3).


Exemptions from Regulation

3. (1) Subject to subsection (3), a driver and operator are exempt from this Regulation while the driver is driving a commercial motor vehicle of a type and in the circumstances described in any of the following paragraphs:

4.A vehicle engaged in providing relief in an emergency, being a situation or impending situation that constitutes a danger of major proportions to life, property or the environment, whether caused by forces of nature, an accident, an intentional act or otherwise.

4.1A vehicle operated by or on behalf of a municipality, road authority or public utility while responding to a situation or impending situation that constitutes an imminent danger, though not one of major proportions, to life, property or the environment, whether caused by forces of nature, an accident, an intentional act or otherwise.

(3) A driver's on-duty time and off-duty time, within the meaning of this Regulation, when he or she is exempt from this Regulation under subsection (1) shall nonetheless be included in the calculations of a driver's hours of off-duty and on-duty time for the purposes of complying with this Regulation on the days when the driver is not exempt under subsection (1). O. Reg. 555/06, s. 3 (3).

IS-RDS-G001 Road Snow Plowing Guideline

Objectives:

- To adhere to the snow clearing standards set out in the Minimum Maintenance Standards and adopted by By-law 40-04.
- To reduce the hazards of snow and ice accumulation.
- To endeavour to maintain passable road conditions for emergency vehicles.
- To maintain safe, passable school and public transit bus routes.
- To reduce economic losses to the community and industry caused by workers not able to get to their jobs or companies not able to move goods.
- To ensure cost-effective winter control snow plowing operations.

Level of Service:

In accordance with the Minimum Maintenance Standards set out in Ontario Regulation 239/02 and amended by Ontario Regulations 23/10 and 47/13, all roads are divided into classes based on a combination of traffic volume and speed limit factors. The Town of Fort Erie maintains roads that range from Class 3, which are well travelled to Class 5, which include roads with stone surfaces. The level of service varies by the road class:

Class 3 – Goal Conditions – Bare Pavement

- Applies to all roads identified in gold on the attached Snow Plow maps.
- Surfaces will be maintained as bare as possible through the continued use of all labour, equipment and materials suited to the conditions.
- To maintain the prescribed level of service on all of the Class 3 roads, Route 14, as shown on Page 27, will be continuously plowed during a normal winter control event, as conditions warrant.

IS-RDS-G001 Road Snow Plowing Guideline, Continued

Class 4 – Goal Conditions – Centre Bare Pavement

- Applies to all roads identified in red on the attached Snow Plow maps.
- Surfaces will be maintained to achieve centre bare pavement through the use of all labour, equipment and materials suited to the conditions.

Class 5 – Goal Conditions – Snow Packed Surface

- Applies to all roads identified in green on the attached Snow Plow maps.
- Surfaces shall be maintained in a snow packed condition, (i.e. not maintained to bare pavement).

Procedure:

- The Supervisor, Road and Roadside Drainage Services, or his designate will determine the proper action to be taken based on the level of service to be provided. Weather forecasts, temperature and road conditions for each stage of the storm will be considered.
- Predetermined routes for plowing shall be followed except in critical situations.
- Initially it may be necessary to sand intersections, railroad crossings and dangerous curves and areas during icy conditions. Particular attention will be paid to the priority roads in each area.
- At accumulations of 8 centimetres, the Supervisor of Road and Roadside Drainage Services, or his designate, will activate a plowing operation. Contractors' and Town equipment (see Table 2 "Assigned Plow Routes" on the following page) will be assigned to their designated areas at the discretion of the Supervisor of Road and Roadside Drainage Services, or his designate, based on weather and road conditions.
- As all equipment is deployed to its designated area, roads will be plowed in priority sequence.


Winter Parking Restrictions










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IS-RDS-GOO2 Road Sanding and Salting Guideline

Objectives:

- To adhere to the treatment of icy conditions standards set out in the Minimum Maintenance Standards and adopted by By-law 40-04.
- To minimize the hazard of icy road conditions to motorists.
- To reduce economic losses to the community and industry caused by workers not being able to get to their jobs or companies not able to move goods.
- To endeavour to maintain passable road conditions for emergency vehicles.
- To maintain safe, passable school bus and public transit bus routes.
- To minimize impacts on the environment.
- To ensure cost-effective winter control sanding operations.

Level of Service:

In accordance with the Minimum Maintenance Standards set out in Ontario Regulation 239/02 and amended by Ontario Regulations 23/10 and 47/13, all roads are divided into classes based on a combination of traffic volume and speed limit factors. The Town of Fort Erie maintains roads that range from Class 3, which are well travelled to Class 5, which include roads with stone surfaces. The level of service varies by the road class:

Class 3 – Goal Condition – Bare Pavement

- Applies to all Class 3 roads, which are included as part of the Salting Routes, shown in the following table.
- Surfaces will be maintained as bare as possible through the continued use of all assigned labour, equipment and materials suited to the conditions.
- Primary goal will be to achieve bare pavement through treatment of roads for their entire length; the use of straight salt and brine mixture is permitted to bring the desired results.

IS-RDS-GOO2 Road Sanding and Salting Guideline, Continued

Class 4 – Goal Condition – Centre Bare Pavement

- Applies to Class 4 roads, which are included as part of the Priority Sanding Routes, shown in the following table.
- Surfaces will be maintained to achieve centre bare pavement through the use of all assigned labour, equipment and materials suited to the conditions.
- Primary goal will be to achieve centre bare pavement with minimal, cost effective use of sand/salt mixture and liquid brine.
- During storm and icy conditions, sanding of icy areas will be performed or carried out on curves, steep grades, intersections, school areas, school bus drop off points, business areas and pedestrian crossing areas.

Class 5 – Goal Condition – Snow Packed Surface

- Applies to Class 5 roads, which are included as part of the Secondary Sanding Routes, shown in the following table.
- Primary goal will be a snow packed surface.
- During storm and icy conditions, sanding of icy areas will be performed or carried out on curves, steep grades, intersections, school areas, school bus drop off points, business areas and pedestrian crossing areas.
- Salt will never be applied to primed or graveled roads. Salt use will also be limited on surface-treated and paved surfaces that are in generally poor condition with extensive cracking and poor base conditions.

Brine

Liquid brine is used as the dissolved salt releases heat, melting and breaking the bond of ice and snow on roadways. The brine is mixed on the truck and applied using a spray system.

IS-RDS-GOO2 Road Sanding and Salting Guideline, Continued

Standard Salt / Sand Mixture

The general application will be a standard mixture of 10% salt and 90% natural sand. Where weather and road conditions indicate an advantage for removal of packed snow and ice, a higher salt content may be used in the mixture at the direction of the Manager of Roads and Fleet, or his designate.

Procedure:

- Necessary sand and salt will normally be stockpiled by November 1st. The larger of the two domes at the Gibson Centre will be filled with the standard salt/sand mixture. The small dome at the Gibson Centre will be stockpiled with salt.
- All equipment used in the course of winter sanding operations will be checked and ready for use by November 1st. This will include all regular maintenance, repairs and performance checks.
- The Supervisor of Road and Roadside Drainage Services, or his designate, will determine the proper action to be taken based on the level of service to be provided. Weather forecasts, temperature and road conditions for each stage of the storm will be considered.
- Predetermined routes for sanding and salting shall be followed except in critical conditions.
- The speed of the sander unit will be regulated and kept consistent to maintain a uniform spread.
- For spreading sand, the spinner will be turning only fast enough for the sand to be spread in a 2 to 2 1/2 metre path down the centre of the road or lane as required.
- Additional salt must not be added to the standard mixture unless instructed by the Manager of Roads and Fleet, or his designate.
- The use of salt is to be limited, in terms of quantity and frequency, to that which is necessary to prevent snow and ice from sticking to the pavement or to remove snow and ice already formed on the pavement.
- For spreading salt, a narrow strip (30 cm wide) shall be spread on the crown of the road. On curves, the salt shall be spread on the high side.

IS-RDS-GOO2 Road Sanding and Salting Guideline, Continued

Procedure, Continued

- During storm and icy conditions, sanding of icy areas will be performed or carried out on curves, steep grades, intersections, school areas, school bus drop off points, business areas and pedestrian crossing areas.
- Continuous sanding shall be carried out only during freezing rain or general icy conditions.
- The Supervisor of Road and Roadside Drainage Services, or his designate, will determine the appropriate response to any request from the Niagara Regional Police Service to sand or salt road sections which they have identified as a hazard.
- Winter sand clean up, including machine sweeping, shall commence as soon as weather permits, and will be completed generally by the end of May.

IS-RDS-G003 Snow Removal Guideline

Objectives:

- To prevent large accumulations of snow from reducing the required travelled portion of roads and streets.
- To accommodate on street parking in business areas of the town.
- To reduce the hazard to motorists and pedestrians.
- To reduce the occurrence of drainage blockages and the possibility of road flooding.
- To prevent the unauthorized depositing of snow, ice or other material from private property such as driveways or parking lots, onto Town of Fort Erie road allowances.

Level of Service:

- Snow shall be removed from the designated areas as indicated on the attached list as soon as possible after a storm when the windrow on the sidewalk exceeds 1 metre in height.
- Snow to be removed from priority streets and roads when windrow exceeds 1 metre in height and presents a parking hazard, a drainage problem or a sight line obstruction.
- Snow will be removed from other locations such as cul-de-sacs, intersections, and school crossings as required.
- Prior to Nighttime Snow Removal operations, the area will be posted to advise the public of the work intended.

IS-RDS-G003 Snow Removal Guideline, Continued

Procedure:

- Snow will be removed from the areas identified on the attached list as soon after a storm as labour and equipment are available.
- Under provincial Hours of Work legislation, the removal of snow may be delayed by required rest time, if manpower is unavailable due to a lengthy storm.
- In rural areas, snow will be blown or pushed back where possible to widen the travelled portion of the road or to improve sight lines at intersections.

Nighttime Snow Removal Procedures

- The area scheduled for snow removal will have an appropriate sign indicating parking restrictions installed no later than 4:00 p.m. on the afternoon prior to removal.
- When possible, phone contact will be made to the appropriate Business Improvement Area to inform them of the scheduled snow removal.
- The By-Law Enforcement division will be notified to assist in the removal of illegally parked cars, as specified in Parking By-law 2000-89.
- Initially, snow will be piled using the appropriate equipment starting at 10:00 p.m. or later if the amount of snow is relatively small.
- Trucks will be called out approximately two hours later and the snow hauled to the closest area designated for dumping.
- Snow hauling operations will be completed, when possible, by the start of the business day at 9:00 a.m.

Areas Designated for Regular Snow Removal

Nighttime Snow Removal only:

Jarvis Street – Niagara Boulevard to east of Mack Street

Niagara Boulevard – Queen Street to Bertie Street (both sides) – West side, Bertie Street to Catherine Street (in front of businesses only)

Ridge Road – Wilson Avenue to Farr Avenue

Day or Nighttime Snow Removal:

Derby Road – Erie Road to North of Queens Circle

- **Derby Road** North Side of Queens Circle to Rebstock Road (West Side only.)
- Erie Road North side from Ridgeway Rd. to Schooley Rd. (in front of businesses only)

Central Avenue – QEW bridge deck from Queen St to Garrison (to clear sidewalks)

Daytime Snow Removal:

Other Locations as required - Cul-de-sacs, intersections, bus loading areas, school crossings

IS-RDS-GOO4 Snow Fence Erection and Removal Guideline

Objectives:

The objective of snow fence is to trap and deposit blowing snow on the ground before it causes whiteouts or accumulates on municipally controlled roadways during the winter season.

Level of Service:

Snow fence shall be erected where snow drifting across Town roadways is commonly expected.

Procedure:

Snow Fence Erection

When possible, property owners will be advised of the erection of fence. Snow fence can be erected on private property under the authority of the Municipal Act, 2001, S.O. 2001, c. 25, s. 60:

"Despite section 19, a municipality may, at any reasonable time, enter upon any land within the municipality or within an adjoining municipality and lying along any highway under its jurisdiction, including land owned by Her Majesty in right of Ontario, for the purpose of erecting and maintaining a snow fence."

- Snow fence shall be erected in the months of November and December.
- Snow fence will be erected between 15 to 30 metres from the edge of the travelled portion of the side of road mainly on the prevailing wind side.
- T-bars (posts) shall be spaced evenly at approximately 5 metres apart in a straight line and at a uniform height to the top of the Tbars.
- T-bars shall be driven a minimum of 60 centimetres into the ground.

IS-RDS-GOO4 Snow Fence Erection and Removal Guideline, Continued

Snow Fence Erection, Continued

- Fence is to be placed on the prevailing upwind (windward side) side of the T-bars and fastened to the T-bars with tie wires.
- Snow fence shall be erected so that the bottom of the fence is 15 centimetres above the ground.
- Fence shall be stretched tight enough to prevent excessive vertical sag.
- T-bars shall be braced with additional T-bars on a 45-degree angle every ninth post and at the ends. In areas susceptible to high winds, additional T-bars may be braced.
- The number of rolls used at each location is approximate.

Snow Fence Removal

- Snow fence shall be removed in the months of March and April.
- Repairs required to the snow fence shall be made while the fence is in place, if possible.

IS-RDS-G005 Winter Road Patrol Guideline

Objectives:

- To adhere to the Minimum Maintenance Standards, O.Reg. 239/02, and in particular, the amendments for increased patrol requirements set out in O.Reg. 23/10 and the increased weather monitoring specified in O.Reg. 47/13;
- To provide regular monitoring of winter road conditions;
- To provide a written record of conditions and actions;
- To ensure that patrols and inspections address the essential and important aspects of conditions; and,
- To provide factual documented information in a manner that can be used in defence of future potential liability actions.

Level of Service:

- During business hours, Monday to Friday, 7 a.m. to 5 p.m., road patrols will be assigned as required by the Supervisor, Road and Roadside Drainage Services, or his designate.
- After business hours, road patrols will be conducted as required by the Roads On-call Supervisor.
- From approximately November 1st to March 31st of each winter season, roads will be patrolled from 9 p.m. to 7 a.m. by the following staff:
 - a Midnight Road Patrol person Monday evening to Friday morning
 - a Weekend Crew Leader Friday evening to Tuesday morning
- Daily records of temperature and weather conditions will be maintained as per the Minimum Maintenance Standards.
- During inclement winter weather conditions, Road Surface Condition Reports (Winter) as in the following example will be competed and filed.

IS-RDS-G005 Winter Road Patrol Guideline, Continued

Procedure:

- Road Patrols are to be conducted by qualified municipal employees in a safe and legal manner, for the purpose of establishing and reporting the condition of the road. The patrol may also be used to initiate action, perform activity to remedy or mitigate the circumstances found.
- Standard forms for reporting road patrols shall be used. A sample form follows.

IS-RDS-G006 Sidewalk Snow Plowing Guideline

Objectives:

- To maintain safe, passable priority sidewalks for pedestrian traffic during winter months.
- To reduce the number of occasions that sidewalk conditions might discourage pedestrian traffic in commercial areas, thereby creating a hardship for citizens and the business community.
- To reduce the possibility of incidents that could result in liability claims against the Town of Fort Erie.

Level of Service:

- This guideline applies only to Priority Sidewalks (approximately 56 kms of total 160 kms) based on
 - Proximity and access to schools, hospital, senior citizens' housing and business areas.
 - Volume of vehicular traffic adjacent to sidewalks.
- Priority Sidewalks are shown in blue in the following Sidewalk Snow Plowing Maps.
- Priority Sidewalks will be cleared as quickly as possible upon the completion of road surface maintenance and subject to the availability of Town staff and contract equipment.
- Property owners are encouraged to clear the sidewalks adjacent to their property as there is no plowing of sidewalks not deemed Priority Sidewalks and, in severe conditions, there may be a delay in the clearing of the Priority Sidewalks.

IS-RDS-G006 Sidewalk Snow Plowing Guideline, Continued

Procedure:

- The Supervisor of Road and Roadside Drainage Services, or his designate, will determine the proper action to be taken based on the level of service indicated above.
- Plowing of sidewalks along priority roads will be conducted first in each of the five areas.

Sidewalk Snow Plow Routes and Equipment:





- Transit Stop clearing will be performed once after plowing and completed within 48 hours of the end of accumulation.









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IS-RDS-G007 Parking Lots, Alleyways and Dead End Snow Plow Guideline

Objectives:

- To reduce the hazards of snow and ice accumulation.
- To endeavour to maintain passable road conditions for emergency vehicles.
- To maintain safe and passable routes for the public.
- To ensure the cost effectiveness of winter control operations.

Level of Service:

- All parking lots and alleyways will be considered Class 6 in the road care system, (i.e. not subject to legislated Minimum Maintenance Standards.)
- The parking lots, alleyways and dead ends will be those identified in the periodic contract for plowing.
- Snow plowing of these areas will commence, if required, at the end of an event during overnight hours.
- Surfaces will be maintained in a snow packed condition.

Procedure:

- The Supervisor, Road and Roadside Drainage Services, or his designate shall determine the proper action to be taken based on the level of service to be provided.
- The predetermined list specifies the areas to be cleared and may be revised at the discretion of the Manager of Roads and Fleet, or his designate.
- The Supervisor of Road and Roadside Drainage Services, or his designate, will call the parking lot contractor to plow the lots listed in Table 7: "Assignment of Parking Lot, Alleyway and Dead End Plowing" on the following pages.

Regulation of Snow Deposits

WHEREAS Subsection 11 of the *Municipal Act. 2001 S.O 2006, .32* as amended provides that the municipality may pass by-laws relating to the health, safety and well being of the inhabitants of the municipality; and

WHEREAS Subsections 445.1 and 446 of the *Municipal Act, 2001*, as amended, provides that if a municipality has the authority under this or any other *Act* or under a by-law under this or any other *Act* direct or require a person to do a matter or thing, the municipality may also provide that, in default of it being done by the person directed or required to do it, the matter or thing shall be done at the person's expense, and may recover the costs by adding them to the tax roll and collecting them in the same manner as taxes;

NOW THEREFORE the Municipal Council of the Town of Fort Erie hereby enacts as follows:

1.0 SHORT TITLE

The short title for this by-law is the "Snow Removal By-Law."

2.0 DEFINITIONS

2.1 The following terms are defined for the purposes of this by-law:

"highway" means a common and public highway and includes a street and a bridge forming part of a highway or on, over or across which a highway passes:

"officer" means a Municipal Law Enforcement Officer, Niagara Regional Police Officer or the Supervisor of Roads and Drainage Services or his designate:

"owner" means a registered owner, but also includes an occupant, lessee, tenant or any other in charge or in control of the premises

"person" includes an owner and may be a natural person, firm, corporation, partnership or association.

"sidewalk" means the portion of the highway or common or public walkway designed for the passage of persons and includes that part of the road where pedestrians have priority over traffic.

PAGE TWO

3.0 GENERAL PROHIBITIONS

- 3.1 No person shall obstruct or permit to be obstructed a sidewalk, by depositing snow or ice on the sidewalk.
- 3.2 No person shall deposit or permit to be deposited snow or ice on a highway that will cause interference with vehicular traffic.
- **3.3** Every person that has or permitted snow and ice to be deposited within a highway or sidewalk shall comply with an order to have the snow or ice removed within the required time period set out in the Order.
- 3.4 All snow or ice shall be removed immediately if there is a danger to vehicles or pedestrians.

4.0 ENFORCEMENT

- 4.1 An officer or their designate shall enforce the provisions of By-law and are authorised to enter on any land at any reasonable time for the purposes of carrying out an inspection to determine whether or not this by-law is being complied with.
- 4.2 Where an owner fails to comply with any provision of this by-law, an Order may be issued to the owner requiring compliance. The Order will give reasonable particulars of the reasons why the snow removal does not comply and indicate the time for complying with the Order and giving notice that, if the Order is not complied with within that time, the Town may carry out the Order at the Owners expense.
- 4.3 An Order may be personally delivered or served by Registered Mail. Where an Order is mailed, the Order shall be deemed delivered on the earlier receipt of the Order by the addressee or the fifth day following the date of mailing, whether actually received or not.
- 4.4 Where an Order has been issued and compliance has not been achieved with in the required time period as set out in the Order the Town may through its employees or agents or persons acting on its behalf may take the necessary steps to effect compliance, and all expenses incurred may be added to the tax roll and collected from the Owner of the property in the same manner as municipal taxes.
- 4.5 Every person who contravenes any provision of this By-law is guilty of an offence and upon conviction is liable to the penalties as prescribed by the *Provincial Offences Act*, R.S.O. 1990 c.P.33

5.0 ADMINISTRATION AND INTERPRETATION

- 5.1 If there is a conflict between a provision of this By-law and a provision of any Other Town By-law, the provisions in this By-law shall apply.
- 5.2 Pursuant to the provisions of Section 23.1 to 23.5 of the Municipal Act, 2001 the Clerk of the Town of Fort Erie is hereby authorised to effect any minor modifications or corrections of an administrative, numerical, grammatical, semantical or descriptive nature or kind to the By-law and schedules as may be necessary after the passage of this By-law.
- 5.3 This by-law shall come into force and effect on the date of passage.

Purpose of Report

The purpose of this report is to recommend that Council approve an enforceable by-law to regulate the depositing of snow and ice from privately owned property onto town owned or maintained sidewalks and road allowances.

Analysis

Background

Through By-law 118-08 Adoption of a Winter Control Plan 2008-2010, Council approved, in principle, the prevention of the depositing of snow and ice from privately owned property onto town owned and maintained sidewalks and roadways:

IS-RDS-G003 Snow Removal Guideline Level of Service:

The depositing of snow, ice or other material from private property onto municipal property is strictly prohibited. Property owners will be required to remove the deposit immediately if there is imminent danger to the motoring public, or within 12 hours otherwise. Failure to remove the snow, ice or other material deposit within the specified timeframe will result in removal by the Town or its contractors, at the property owner's expense.

Snow and ice that is moved from private property onto sidewalks and roadways can disrupt snow plowing efforts and cause imminent danger to pedestrians and travelers. For example, a snow plow route may be considered complete but subsequently deposited snow could obstruct a roadway, posing a safety threat that will not be noted until a resident calls in or a road patrol is conducted.

Significant snow deposited on sidewalks may prevent the passage of the sidewalk snowplow and require the deployment of larger equipment such as a loader to further move the deposit.

Analysis

During recent snowfalls and the subsequent winter control operations, staff has noted a significant number of locations where snow and ice is deposited in sidewalks and highways maintained by Town staff.

These have caused additional costs through the use of various Town equipment such as loaders, graders, trucks and sidewalk snow plows.

A by-law will formalize the guidelines to facilitate Town staff to have these deposits removed. It is recommended that property owners be provided with written notice in person or by registered mail that the deposit is not acceptable. The written notice will provide a timeframe that the property owner or tenant has to remove the deposit, either immediately in the event of imminent danger to pedestrians or highway users, or twelve (12) hours for

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all other deposits. If the deposit is not removed within the specified timeframe, the Town will remove it using Town staff and equipment or arrange the removal through a contractor. In either case, the charges for this removal will be added to the property taxes and collected in the same manner as the taxes.

As the charge may ultimately be added to the property taxes, all reasonable efforts will be made to present the property owner directly with the notice to remove the deposit, to enable him or her to choose to have the deposit removed by his agents.

To facilitate the timely removal of snow and ice deposits that present an imminent danger, it is recommended that the Supervisor of Road and Drainage Services be authorized as an officer to enforce this regulation, in addition to the Municipal Law Enforcement Officer and the Niagara Regional Police.

Financial/Staffing Implications

In the event that a property owner or his designate does not remove the snow in the timeframe detailed by notice provided by the enforcement officer, the Town will have the deposit removed and the cost incurred for this removal will be added to the property taxes.

Currently this cost has been absorbed by the Town of Fort Erie's winter control operating budget.

Policies Affecting Proposal

By-law No. 41-07 adopted Council's 2007-2010 Corporate Strategic Plan, which included the promotion of a high level of responsiveness and service to the public and Council's desire to ensure any fees reflect the true costs of service delivery.

By-law No. 118-08 adopted the Winter Control Plan for 2008-2010 and the principle that snow and ice deposits from private to Town owned property would be prevented.

Comments from Relevant Departments/Community and Corporate Partners

The Town Solicitor has reviewed the provisions of Winter Control Plan, 2008-2010 and the details of this report and supports the development of a by-law to facilitate the enforcement of the principle to prevent snow and ice deposits set out in the Winter Control Plan, 2008-2010.

Operations staff has worked closely with the Municipal Enforcement team to develop clear enforcement provisions and guidelines.

Alternatives

None
